The position is voluntary and would require input of up to one day per month, on an ad hoc basis, in addition to attendance at four committee meetings per year and at the three day Show in October.

82. Design for Centenary Bunting. Three different designs to fit triangular bunting 200mm at the top and 300mm long. Each design to be submitted on an A4 page.

First: £10; Second: £7; Third: £5.

83. Design a Flag for the Centenary. The finished flag size TBD (please check later)

Entries to be submitted on an A4 page. First: £10; Second: £7; Third: £5.

84. Design Logo for the Centenary Medal. The medal size will be 40mm diameter.

Entries to be submitted on an A5 sheet. First: £10; Second: £7; Third: £5.
